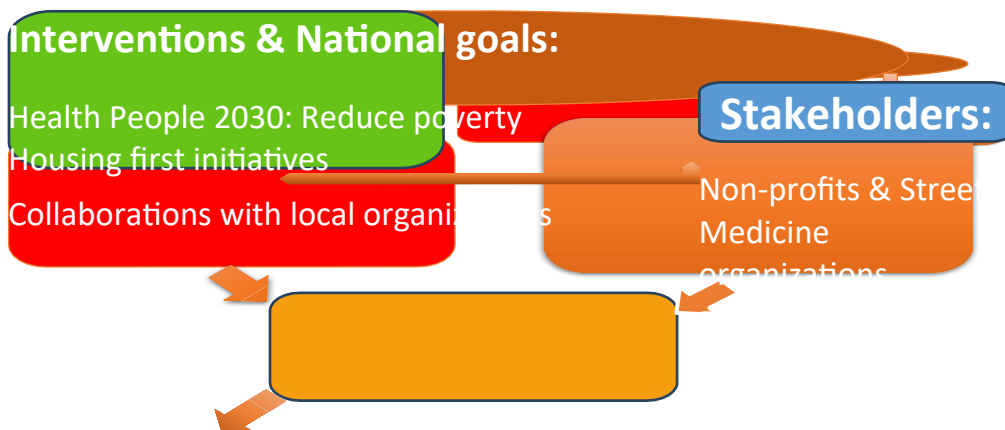

Concept Map Summary: Describe the elements on the Concept Map and include the following.

a. Provide a succinct description of the vulnerable population identified.

Homeless people in urban regions, such as those in Chicago, constitute a population that is much more susceptible to disadvantage for a number of reasons, including a lack of secure housing, restricted access to medical treatment, and increased vulnerability to environmental and safety hazards. Many individuals experience houselessness in Chicago, Illinois, with 65,611 people either living in shelters, temporarily staying with others, or living unsheltered in 2020 (Adams et al., 2023). These individuals frequently face a variety of complicated obstacles, including unemployment, poverty, mental illness, and substance use disorders. All of these factors lead to deteriorating health outcomes and restricted usage of health services.

b. Discuss a minimum of three variables that place the population at risk.

Social and systemic factors, including poverty, unemployment, mental health and substance use challenges, domestic and family violence and discrimination frequently drive homelessness rates (Rukmana, 2020). The three variables that place the population at risk are:

- Limited access to healthcare: Homeless individuals often do not have a primary care provider because they are unable to afford or access the healthcare system. This results in delay or not being able to receive the treatment at all.
